9th Anniversary for **Historic St. Francis Mission School**

On Monday, September 9, 2024, Ak-Chin Him Dak EcoMuseum invited everyone to come out and celebrate the 9th Anniversary of the Francis Historic St. Mission School.

Those who attended were treated to appetizers and gifts to commemorate the special occasion.

The St. Francis Mission School was built in the 1930's by Ak-Chin Labor force and served as an elementary school for 1st - 3rd grades, run by the Franciscan Ministry.

It was also utilized as a meeting place for the Community.

In 2003, Tribal Council asked the Community for input as to what they would like to see done with the Mission School and Bureau of Indian Affairs Agent House.

Home Safety for Elders

Home safety for elders is crucial for maintaining their independence and reducing the risk of accidents, especially falls, which are a leading cause of injury among older adults. Here are key areas of concern and actionable steps to enhance safety in a senior's home:

1. Preventing Falls

Falls are one of the most common causes of injuries among older adults. To reduce the risk of

- Clear Pathways: Keep walkways free of clutter, loose rugs, and electrical cords. Ensure that frequently used items are easily accessible. **Install Grab Bars and Handrails:** Place grab
- bars in bathrooms, next to the toilet, and in the shower or bathtub. Ensure there are sturdy handrails on both sides of staircases. **Non-Slip Flooring:** Use non-slip mats in the
- bathroom and kitchen, and replace any loose or slippery flooring with non-slip alternatives.
- Proper Lighting: Ensure hallways, stairs, and entryways are well-lit. Nightlights are useful in bedrooms and bathrooms to guide seniors if they wake up at night.

2. Bathroom Safety

The bathroom is a high-risk area for slips and falls. To make it safer: Shower Seats and Hand-Held Showers: A

- shower seat provides stability, and a hand-held showerhead allows easier bathing without needing to stand. Raised Toilet Seats: A raised toilet seat
- reduces the need to bend down, easing pressure on joints.
- **Temperature Control:** Install anti-scald devices on faucets and showers to prevent burns from hot water.

3. Fire Safety

Older adults may be more vulnerable to fire hazards. To minimize these risks:

- Smoke Alarms and Carbon Monoxide **Detectors:** Install smoke alarms in every room and test them monthly. Consider interconnected alarms that sound off throughout the house when one is triggered. Install carbon monoxide detectors near sleeping areas and in the kitchen. **Easy Access to Exits:** Ensure there is clear
- access to all exits in case of an emergency. For wheelchair-bound seniors, install ramps if needed. **Fire Extinguishers:** Keep fire extinguishers
- easily accessible, especially in the kitchen. Make sure the elder knows how to use it properly.

4. Medication Management

To avoid confusion with medications: Medication Organizers: Use pill organizers to

- help keep track of daily medication. Clear Labels: Make sure prescription labels
- are easy to read, and store medications in a well-lit area.

5. Home Security

Ensure elders feel safe from external threats:

- Locks and Peepholes: Install deadbolt locks on doors and a peephole or video doorbell for identifying visitors without opening the door.
- Emergency Call Systems: Consider wearable medical alert devices that allow seniors to call for help with the push of a button. These systems can also detect falls and automatically alert emergency services.

6. Kitchen Safety

To prevent burns or accidents in the kitchen:

- Automatic Shut-Off Appliances: Use appliances with an automatic shut-off feature. especially for ovens, stoves, and irons.
- Easy-to-Reach Items: Store frequently used kitchen tools and food within easy reach, avoiding the need for stools or ladders.

7. Vision and Cognitive Decline **Considerations**

For those with declining vision or cognitive • Contrasting Colors: Use contrasting colors on

- the edges of stairs, doorways, and countertops to make it easier for seniors to distinguish these areas. • Simple Instructions and Reminders: Label
- drawers or rooms and use clear instructions for using appliances to help those with cognitive decline.

8. Assistive Technology Technology can help monitor and improve the

safety of seniors: • Smart Home Devices: Voice-activated smart

- home systems can control lights, thermostats, and door locks, reducing the need to move around unnecessarily. **Motion Sensors:** Install motion sensor lights
- in key areas to automatically light up when a person enters a room or hallway. Monitored Systems: Home monitoring
- systems allow family members to check in on seniors and ensure they are safe.

9. Furniture and Layout • Sturdy Furniture: Ensure that chairs and

- tables are sturdy and do not wobble. • Furniture Layout: Arrange furniture to create
- clear paths without tight spaces, making it easy for seniors to move around, especially if they use mobility aids like walkers.

10. Emergency Preparedness Make sure seniors are prepared in case of

emergencies: • Emergency Contacts: Keep a list of emergency

- phone numbers, including family members, caregivers, and doctors, in an easily accessible • First Aid Kits: Ensure a well-stocked first aid
- kit is easily accessible.

Tailoring Safety for Individual Needs Assessing individual needs based on mobility,

cognitive abilities, and vision can help tailor the home safety modifications to an elder's specific situation. Engaging family members or professionals such as occupational therapists can

Water is a very valuable and expensive resource that we use every day. We use water for drinking, bathing, cooking, washing clothes, and for watering our plants and garden or washing our cars.

Also, water is used for recreational purposes, such as

swimming in the pool. Our supply of water is limited and

due to the lack of rainfall in our desert climate, people

should become active in conserving water. Fortunately, Arizona is able to get much of its water from the Colorado River via the CAP canal and runoff from the Aqua Fria However, the Colorado River Basin continues to experience drought and the impacts of hotter and drier condi-

When it comes to conserving water, small changes can make a big difference. Incorporate these tips into your everyday habits and before long, you'll be a natural at

Time your shower to keep it under 5 minutes. You'll save up to 1,000 gallons per month. Choose the right Arizona-friendly plants and watch them

thrive in our desert environment. Turn off the water while you brush your teeth and save up to 4 gallons a minute. That's up to 200 gallons a week for a family of four.

Run your dishwasher only when it's full. You can save up to 1,000 gallons per month.

One drip every second adds up to five gallons per day! Check your faucets and showerheads for leaks. Report leaks to Ak-Chin Housing.

Use a broom instead of a hose to clean patios, sidewalks and driveways, and save water every time.

Start a compost pile. Using compost in your garden or flower beds adds water-holding organic matter to the soil.

Only water the lawn when necessary. If you water your lawn and garden, only water in the early mornings or evenings because temperatures and evaporation are lower.

Take your car to a car wash. One of the benefits of taking your car to a car wash is that water is recycled during the car washing process. Car wash is a great way to conserve resources and save money, while reducing wastewater pollution and protecting our environment.



Hearing Notice Ak-Chin Indian Community

Planning and Zoning Commission will hold a Hearing regarding the following case at 6:00 p.m. on Tuesday September 24, 2024 at the Justice Center Conference Room.

Case: SD-02-19 Elders Center Expansion: Project Applicant/Elder Programs Director, Leslie Carlyle-Burnett, is requesting a time extension on the previously approved Site Development Plan Permit which has expired. The project will expand and remodel portions of the Elders Center facility to accommodate and service the growing needs of the Elders Community. The project consists of:

- Total: 13,459 square feet Elders Center building (Existing 6,550 square feet).
- Addition: New 6,909 square feet expansion to include two large activity rooms, multi-purpose recreational room, walk-in cooler and walk-in freezer, conference room, and support spaces.
- Remodel: kitchen areas, dining room, office areas, and TV lounge.
- New Updates: New ADA ramps in the parking area, relocation of fire connections, new 20-year roof and matching flooring for the dining room and multi-purpose room.

CASE: SD-04-20: Old Bus Stop Renovation: Project Applicant/Him-Dak Director,

Elaine Peters, is requesting a time extension on the previously approved Site Development Plan Permit of the Old Bus Stop Renovation which has expired. The Old Bus Stop is located on the southwest side of the intersection of West Farrell Road and North Church Road. The project consists of:

- Widening the entrance to 3'-10" for ADA access; and
- lowering the window openings to 2'-11"; and
- modifications to the roof to include an added 7'-10" x 10'-5" shaded outdoor area on the west side; and
- adding a 7'-8" x 10'-5" concrete slab for the outdoor area; and
- adding a 5' wide decomposed granite walkway to Farrell Road walkway; and
- adding benches, refuse/recycling containers; and
- adding interior and exterior solar powered lighting.

CASE: SD-05-20: Old Jail House Renovation:

Project Applicant/Him-Dak Director, Elaine Peters, is requesting a time extension on the previously approved Site Development Plan Permit of the Old Jail House Renovation which has expired. The Old Jail House is located at the northeast corner of West Farrell Road and North Church Road. The project consists of:

- Exterior upgrades consisting of, patching and painting the existing stucco, replacing windows, repairing doors, replacing existing roof shingles, and exterior concrete walkway will be demolished and reconstructed to accommodate ADA access to a new opening; and
- Interior renovation to refinish and repaint entire interior, remodel for future administrative offices, ADA restroom improvements, and repurpose storage area for updated Information Technology room and adding a new fire riser.

Halloween: This annual festivity has its origins surrounding fall harvest and the holiday evening before "All Saints Day" hence the "Hallowed evening" - which celebrates the lives of those who passed

Today, our children will dress up as favorite characters this September featuring harvest pumpkins, corn stalks and costumes with, oh yes, candy treats.


This is also a great time to plan for the managing your pest control for this fall as the change in weather and temperatures will have pests coming to your door: The "unwanted Goblins". Integrated Pest Management or IPM can be very cost effective while reducing the need for pesticides around the home.

Take this time to take inventory of pesticides and be sure that they are all out of reach of children as the label states. This is a great time for planning to make sure the real goblins are not invited to your home.

The candy wrappers and holiday debris that are cleaned up and properly disposed of will deprive ants, flies and roaches as well as other pests such as rodents of the food and habitat that can welcome them into your home.

Fall cleaning and taking steps to remove toys, planters, pots and other water holding items outside can greatly reduce mosquito larvae habitat. Fall cleaning can also be very effective in IPM for your

The following tips can make great progress in keeping your home "Goblin Keep living areas clean and uncluttered

Put food in tightly sealed containers Keep trash in closed trash units Seal and repair plumbing leaks Seal entry points such as gaps and cracks in the walls and pipes entering your home; the use of caulking, steel wool and other barriers can be most effective to excluding pests



There was a number of different prizes to win, some got cool superhero prizes like Spiderman gear, Batman games, some were able to win


gift cards, even the dogs were able to win this walk with one big prize being a large Captain America dog bed, along with a toy.




