## Presidential Rallies in full force for Arizona

As the national election quickly approaches, former and current Congressional leaders and former Presidential leaders are doing their part in promoting and endorsing their party's candidate.

Ak-Chin Chairman Robert Miguel has been invited to attend numerous rallies in the past month, including the rally in Gila River Indian Community, where U.S. President Joe Biden said he had come to "Right a wrong."

On October 25, 2024 President Biden apologized for the abuse committed against Native American students who attended various boarding schools throughout the United States during the past 150 years.

He talked about how the federal government mandated the removal

of children from their families and tribes and sent to federal boarding schools; "taken away from places they didn't know, with people they never met and spoke a language they had never heard... lost generations, cultures and language, lost trust."

He pointed out how the federal government had never formally apologized for what happened over the past 150 years, "until today. I formally apologize, as President of the United States of America for what we did."

Deb Haaland, US Secretary of the Interior was also a speaker at the event.

Chairman Miguel stated that during his 11-year career as a Tribal leader, this moment was something that will be engrained with him for

the rest of his life.

"To hear President Biden say something like that on a national stage and on Native land, speaks volumes of his leadership and how truly apologetic he is to this tragedy; was very emotional and sincere.

We, for so long, have suffered and have been unnoticed in a sense, are finally being recognized and are identified as equals."

Chairman Miguel also attended a rally at the University of Arizona campus in Tucson, on Friday, October 18th, with former President, Barack Obama.

Obama encouraged early ballot voting and putting the right candidates in office, who will work to represent all people and not a political party of choice.

Mass was celebrated with Fr. Antony Tinker at 10am, accompanied by the choir, which included Lawrence and Sally Antone and Lerline Peters. Following the mass, opening procession of the St. Francis of Assisi statue around

the church grounds commenced. Afterwards, St. Francis was placed in a decorated altar for the feast.

At the beginning of July, the Strong Heart Study sponsored a Hula for Health Amongst Native Americans program for all Indigenous peoples ranging from 30-79 years old at the Ak-Chin Service Center.

This program included participants attending 8 classes over a span of 8 weeks held on Thursdays beginning on July 11, 2024, learning the importance of movement using Hula dancing in a seated position.

The overall goal was to

measure heart health in hopes to lower blood pressure and learning important habits to keep oneself healthy. Attendees of this program expressed admiration for the classes and music; the classes left them feeling great.

Throughout the program 10 participants were consistent in attendance; this was celebrated by instructors Alicia Ku'uleinani and Celina Mahinalani as they provided a Hawaiian meal during their last class.

On October 21, Elders from the Ak-Chin Indian Community set off on a fun-filled journey to the Grand Canyon. Their first stop was Bearizona, where perfect weather brought out active wildlife. They saw mountain goats, wolves, reindeer, deer, bison, and playful bears swimming and climbing trees.

After a BBQ lunch, the Elders explored Bearizona's gift shop, where they marveled at a giant python, a black panther and cheetah. Those who wondered out also seen armadillos, elk, more bears, racoons and otters.

Afterwards everyone was whisked away to the



Grand Canyon Railway Hotel, in Williams. Once checked in, everyone was invited to dine together at the Fred Harvey Restaurant.

The next day, they had breakfast again at Fred Harvey Restaurant and then boarded the Grand Canyon Railway train for a 2.5-hour ride to the

Grand Canyon, sharing laughs and stories along the way. Upon arrival, the Elders took in the breathtaking canyon views, enjoyed lunch, shopped, and soaked up the beautiful weather.

Dinner and overnight accommodations were provided at the Maswik Lodge at Grand Canyon.

Those who chose could also venture back to Grand Canyon for more exploring or other dinner options.

Breakfast was provided at Maswik Food Court, before boarding back on the bus for the last leg of travel at the Grand Canyon National Park. Stops included a picturesque view of the Canyon and a visit to Desert View Watch Tower for panoramic views. The last scheduled stop was to Cameron Trading Post for lunch and more shopping.

The Elders expressed heartfelt thanks to tour guide David Fish, bus driver Joe, and Free Spirit Vacations for a memorable experience.

# Let's Talk Toka

The Ak-Chin Indian Community has exposed the youth to a variety of sports for generations; whether it be basketball, t-ball, volleyball, etc., children were provided options when it came to athletics. Whether you were forced to play by parents/guardians or had a genuine interest in sports, there has always been ample opportunity to explore what's offered. But let's spark your interest in a different sport; Toka.

Indian Community, Tohono O'odham Nation and Gila River Indian Community.

At the beginning of each Toka tournament, players from all teams join in a circle to sing the "Toka Nei," the toka song. The first teams to play will stand facing each other in a line with their sticks and wait for the song to end, when the O'la is thrown in the middle, then the games begin.

Ak-Chin has two teams hailing from it, Ba:ban Ci'Ci'Vidam and S-Kubjuv Ju:dam; both teams will be participating in Masik Tas this year.

Ba:ban Ci'Ci'Vidam is a team that has been around since 2011, the first official team of Ak-Chin, though demonstrations of the sport have been shown to members at a number of Him Dak and NARD Celebrations prior.

Ba:ban Ci'Ci'Vidam was initially started by coach Gwendolyn Lopez, her team comprised of members of her family and friends; they have girls and women who are well seasoned in the sport, not afraid to show aggression when needed.

A memorial team, S-Kubjuv Ju:dam was formed by family and friends in memory of the late Holly Antone; who's impact on the community will not be forgotten. The past couple of years, this team has grown significantly and intrigued the younger generations into giving the sport a try.

In preparation of Masik Tas, S-Kubjuv Ju:dam have had the pleasure of attending two tournaments to start the Toka season; one in Anegam Village on September 21, 2024 and the other in Santa Rosa on October 12, 2024.

The team is still fairly new, but have high expectations for themselves, practicing

every week on Thursday evenings and Sunday mornings.

Both tournaments have allowed coaches to pin point areas of weakness; this is then implemented into practices for the team. Ju:dam coaches take great focus on the younger girls too, training them one on one at times to help them become comfortable in their positions on the field.

Recently, a member of S-Kubjuv Ju:dam, Amber Antone was asked to demonstrate the game of Toka during the Indigenous People's Day event held at the Heard Museum in Phoenix on October 14, 2024. Taking place twice throughout the day, Amber explained the ins and outs of Toka, highlighting the cultural significance for O'odham girls and women.

During the second session of the demonstration held at 3 PM Amber, along with Marissa Antone, one of the coaches for S-Kubjuv Ju:dam and sister of Holly, showcased the game for watchers. During this time, the crowd was invited to try their hand in hitting or ask questions regarding Toka.

S-Kubjuv Ju:dam will be participating in tournaments held in November leading up to Masik Tas, everyone is encouraged to attend.

The upcoming Masik Tas celebration will mean plenty of exciting events for members and residents to partake in; including the Spiritual Run, Light Parade, Youth Council hosted Community Day, the Masik Tas Carnival/Rodeo days and the variety of tournaments. Cultural games will also be available for all to come see on December 14, 2024, these include the Songivul and the Toka tournament.



## Community Thanks for Successful Door-to-Door HHW Collection

The Ak-Chin Indian Community's Environmental Programs would like to extend its heartfelt thanks to everyone participating in our recent Door-to-Door Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) collection event on October 15, 2024.

The event was a great success, helping to protect our environment by properly disposing of hazardous materials that could otherwise harm the land and water.

During this event, we collected over 860 pounds of HHW, including materials such as cleaning chemicals, aerosols, oil and water mixtures, and compressed gas cylinders. These hazardous materials were safely processed and

prevented from entering our landfills, where they could have caused contamination or harm to wildlife.

In addition, we processed 4 55-gallon drums of used cooking oil, 6 55-gallon and 2 30-gallon drums of various types of grease, motor oil, and many other forms of hazardous waste. Properly disposing of HHW is not just a task, it's a responsibility we all share.

Your actions are essential for keeping dangerous chemicals out of the environment and preventing pollution. By participating in events like this, you help reduce the risk of water contamination and maintain a healthier ecosystem. Your efforts contribute to a cleaner,

safer community for everyone.

# Pilgrimage to Magdalena is still Going Strong among the O'odham Tribes Near & Far

As the fall season began for a handful of Ak-Chin members and residents, that meant it was time to prepare for their yearly journey to Magdalena de Kino, Sonora, Mexico.

Each year, a week of their time is dedicated to participating in a ritual pilgrimage that spans over 60 miles. Starting from the San Pedro y San Pablo Mission in Tubutama, the travelers walk over a span of four days to get to the Magdalena de Kino Church, which is also where the remains of Father Eusebio Francisco Kino lie.

A big celebration is always held on October 4th, at the mission church in honor of not only Father Kino but also St. Francis of Assisi and St. Francis Xavier.

Although traditionally December 3rd is the feast day of St. Francis Xavier and October 4th is the feast day of St. Francis of Assisi, founder of the Franciscan order, all three "Francis" Saints are celebrated as they all link to one another through the work they have done not only through the church, but through different indigenous communities as well, mainly the Tohono O'odham tribes. O'odham from the four sister tribes aren't the only group to make their way to the big church in Magdalena, numerous residents of Mexico can be seen walking or riding horseback in the direction of the church.

For decades families of Ak-Chin have been making a yearly journey to Magdalena to pay homage to the father and saints. There they would visit the statue of St. Francis Xavier, which was always located inside of the church, until 2013 when a small chapel was built specifically for Father Kino, which made a bigger space where visitors could sit and pray, as well as leave gifts such as flowers and ribbons.

Some families would make a day trip to the church and back home and some would camp out for days, no matter the timeframe the first thing they would do when they got into town was make their way to the church. A majority would take their saints from home and carry them to the church to be blessed where the life-sized statue of St. Francis Xavier rests. Carrying the prayers of their families, friends, and community, they would leave all the prayers there with the beloved saint.

On October 17th, the Ak-Chin Circle had a special movie showing in honor of, "The Pilgrimage to Magdalena," which was made in 2020. The film featured some Ak-Chin walkers and emphasized what the pilgrimage to Magdalena entailed. The pilgrimage is a tradition that has been around for a number of years, a week-long journey that will test your faith, strength in prayer and endurance. Just like the families that travel to the church by vehicle, walkers also carry the prayers of their loved ones. Each walker has their own reasons for participating in

the journey.

"The Pilgrimage to Magdalena" is highly recommended for those that would like more insight about the pilgrimage or even just to see a glimpse of what the walkers experience while on their journey. Some of the writers and board members of the organization that made the movie were also in attendance. Writer Jerry Haas spoke to everyone about how the movie came about and left the mic open for the audience to share their stories about their journey to Magdalena and what it meant to them.

This year's walkers out of Ak-Chin were Gabe Lopez, Francisco Miguel, Kathleen Miguel, Connor Miguel, Dean Peters, Stephanie Antone, Jennifer Zepeda, and Jordan Lopez. We were able to get some feedback from walkers Gabe and Dean about their pilgrimage, sharing their personal experiences and giving advice to those that may be thinking about starting their pilgrimage.

*I just completed my 11th year on the pilgrimage, I started walking in 2013. My family has participated in the Feast of St. Francis Celebration in Magdalena, Sonora Mexico before I was born, and continued today. I have a picture of my grandparents, Jonas and Mathilda Miguel'budt, my aunt Dora Jane'budt and my mother, on back of the picture states "Magdalena 1943" my mother was 1 years old. That picture is on my staff.*

*I always knew I wanted to participate; my uncle Benedict Miguel always invited me to walk with him. But I was too busy with work, I guess I wasn't ready to make my commitment. We were told, when you commit to the pilgrimage, you have to commit to four years to fulfill your commitment. In 2012, our family went to Ma:lina to meet my uncle and others from the community as they walked into the Plaza of Ma:lina. I remember seeing my uncle walking in and I could see the pain, suffering, tiredness and stress he had on his face. I remember I got really emotional, and this heavy emotional feeling came over me, and it really affected me. At that moment, I knew I had to take part in the pilgrimage. That year was the last time my Uncle Benedict walked on the pilgrimage.*

*For me, the whole part of the pilgrimage is exciting, the preparation of your mind, body and spirit. When we*

*start our walk in the town of Tubutama, Sonora at the church of San Pedro y San Pablo Apostoles. The people feed us before we start our walk, and when we start our walk, they come out of their homes and watch us as we walk out of the town, and they wave and wish us a good walk.*

*Reconnecting with friends and family on both sides of the border, and you only see them during this time. People offering us food along the way, they say that they also receive blessing by this gesture, and also give us blessing on our pilgrimage.*

*Walking along the roads to Ma:lina and seeing the landscape and sleeping on the sides of road, sleeping under the stars and listening to the coyotes at night, peace and quiet.*

*Another special moment, walking into Ma'lina and coming out of the mountains and seeing the bell tower of the Church of Parroquia Santa Maria Magdalena, your emotions start to settle in. And walking into the Plaza and seeing your family, that moment is pretty special. Paying your respects to St. Francis, having our last Church Mass, and receiving your prayer ribbons (Li:li:ston), feeling that physical and emotional weight being lifted, and your reconnected; Mind, Body, Spirit and Faithfully. You know you had a good Pilgrimage.*

*This year I had a few calls from individuals discouraging us from making the pilgrimage this year, the illegal activity in the Sonora region had escalated. I reached out to some of the organizers and some members of our group, and we all decided that we needed to be strong in our faith and our commitment (to) St. Francis, and continue the pilgrimage. As we entered Sonora, Mexico at the Sasabe Port-of-Entry, we were greeted by the Sonora State Police and the Mexican Military. We were escorted to Tubutama by the police and military, along the way, we witnessed many burned out vehicles.*

*From start to finish, we were escorted by the Sonoran State Police and the presence of the Mexican Military patrolling the roads was very visible. A friend informed us that the cartels know we are not a threat to them, and that they know we are walking for a purpose, they will not bother you guys.*

*My advice, if you haven't witnessed the Feast of St. Francis in Magdalena (Ma:lina), go and partake in the activities. Learn about the culture, so you won't have a culture shock when you decide to partake in the pilgrimage. Talk with people that have been on the pilgrimage, the experience will be different for everyone, and every year the experience will be different. You, yourself will know when it's time for you to make that commitment.*

*For me, it was something that I was needing, reconnecting Mind, Body, Spirit, Faith, Culturally and Traditionally. It is also my way of giving Thanks to all our ancestors, all of those who have made the pilgrimage,*

For those who aren't able to travel to the church in Magdalena, a variety of villages within the Tohono O'odham Nation hold their own St. Francis feast throughout the month of October. The main feast, also known as the "ge'e piast," is held annually on October 4th, with a different village hosting the celebration each year.

The "ge'e piast" begins with a rosary and mass followed by different entertainment, the main one includes waila bands that play throughout the night until the next morning, ending at 5 am with a rosary to conclude the feast. During this time walkers can also be seen coming from all directions making their way to the "Ge'e Piast."



## U.S. Department of Energy Announces the Availability of the Final Environmental Impact Statement for Activities in Support of Commercial HALEU Production

The U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) released the final Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) evaluating the potential impacts of the Department's Proposed Action to acquire, through procurement from commercial sources, high-assay low-enriched uranium (HALEU) and to facilitate the establishment of commercial HALEU fuel production.

HALEU is a crucial material required by most U.S. advanced reactors to achieve smaller designs, longer operating cycles, and increased efficiencies over current nuclear energy technologies. HALEU is not currently available in sufficient amounts from domestic suppliers. The lack of an adequate domestic, commercial fuel supply could impede both reactor demonstrations and the development of future advanced reactor technologies.

The final EIS follows the Notice of Availability of the Draft HALEU EIS on March 8, 2024. DOE formally accepted comments on the draft through April 22, 2024, but accepted comments received beyond that date to the extent practicable. During the review and comment period, DOE held two virtual Tribal listening sessions, one in-person Tribal listening session, and three virtual public hearings. DOE received a total of 223 comment submissions on the draft EIS. Thirty-six of those comment submissions came from Tribes or Tribal members and the rest came from Federal and state agencies, industry, nonprofit organizations, and the public. In preparing the final HALEU EIS, DOE considered and responded to all comments. The responses can be found in Volume 3 of the final HALEU EIS.

The Final EIS is available on the project website at <https://www.energy.gov/ne/haleu-environmental-impact-statement>.

Requests for physical copies of the final HALEU EIS can be made through email to HALEU-EIS@nuclear.energy.gov or U.S. mail to, Mr. James Lovejoy, DOE EIS Document Manager, U.S. Department of Energy, Idaho Operations Office, 1955 Fremont Avenue, MS 1235, Idaho Falls, Idaho 83415.

DOE will issue a Record of Decision for the final HALEU EIS no sooner than 30 days after the publication of the Notice of Availability of the final HALEU EIS by the Environmental Protection Agency. The Record of Decision will be available in the Federal Register and on the project website.


