# **Ak-Chin Celebrates San Juan Feast**

For decades, the Ak-Chin Community has celebrated the San Juan Church, a clerical that was once considered the community's official for religious place services.

It originally sat a couple of hundred yards to the west of where the current waila grounds are located, it now sits on the Miguel family grounds.

Just as it has in years past, the celebration of San Juan continued on Saturday, July 26th.

Festivities began early morning as rosary was recited by Lerline Peters,

our ancestors was once as far out at the "M" mountain, which is now located within the Gila River Indian Community boundaries.

ancestors, who were farmers, once lived near the bottom of the mountain and found that the land had alkali, which would interfere with farming so they migrated further south to what is now Ak-Chin.

During those days different villages would come out to help harvest crops. Some would end up finding a spouse and

stay in Ak-Chin, which is another reason our members have multiple relatives outside Ak-Chin and in surrounding villages, including the Lucy Village, "We're all relatives, we're all connected in one way or another." stated Lopez.

She also spoke of how the times are changing and how we are now able to use the internet to find out certain information, whether it be about our community or a tribal member. Lopez recalled the time she was able to find the location of

a World War II soldier who had been "lost". At the time she was the head of the enrollment department in the Ak-Chin Community and needed to find this person's location for enrollment purposes. All she knew was that he may have been residing in Arkansas.

She searched for almost two years, when she could not find his current address, she began searching cemeteries and eventually found that he unfortunately passed in 1960, his final resting place being in Little

## **Elder Trips** for Hawaii and Nashville Postponed to 2026

To Ak-Chin Indian Community Elders,

Thank you to everyone who filled out the poll for the elder trips to Hawaii and Nashville. Your time and participation are greatly appreciated.

We have found that many elders wishing to travel out of state by flight do not have their REAL ID. The REAL ID is a special travel identification, just like a driver's license, and is now required for all domestic and international flights.

Without a REAL ID, you will not be able to participate in the elder trips that involve flying. However, trips by bus do not require a REAL ID.

We are excited to announce that the Hawaii and Nashville trips are still in the planning stages and will take place, although, they have been postponed until 2026. The REAL ID is mandatory for boarding a flight, and we want to ensure that all elders have the opportunity to attend these trips.

Obtaining a REAL ID is not difficult. You will need the following information:

- Proof of birth: Original birth certificate, U.S. passport
- Two documents showing proof of mailing address: These documents must be from different sources and include your name and current address - utility bills, bank statements, insurance policies • Social Security Number: You'll need to provide
- your complete Social Security number

If you need assistance obtaining your REAL ID, please call the Elder Center. We will help you with transportation and the application process.



## **Mind the Burrows: Keeping Arizona's Owls and Desert Healthy**

Sonoran Desert is home to one of the Southwest's most unique and charismatic birds, the Burrowing Owl (Athene cunicularia). These small, long-legged owls are federally protected under the Migratory Bird Treaty Act. Wildlife officials are reminding residents, hikers, and construction crews that it is essential to keep a safe distance from their nesting grounds to ensure their survival (U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, 2021).

Unlike many owls that roost in trees, Burrowing Owls make their homes in underground burrows; often those abandoned by prairie dogs, ground squirrels, or even manmade culverts. This behavior leaves them vulnerable to human disturbance. Nesting sites are typically active from February through August, when the Owls lay eggs, raise chicks, and prepare the young

leaving chicks exposed to predators and the desert heat (Arizona Game and Fish Department, n.d.).



Although they are present in Arizona year-round, some burrowing owls exhibit local migrations, especially in the northern edges of their range. In the Sonoran Desert, many stay through the winter, but some migrate short distances south or to lower elevations in fall (usually between September and October) and return in late winter (January to February) (Cornell Lab of Ornithology, 2024).

Burrowing Owls also provideimportantbenefits to our desert ecosystem. As predators of insects, mammals, small reptiles, they help control populations of grasshoppers, beetles, mice, and other pests.

other species. By maintaining healthy prey balances, these Owls support the desert's natural diversity and reduce the spread agricultural pests (Arizona Game and Fish Department, n.d.).

Federal protections mean it is illegal to harass, harm, or remove these birds or their nests. **Biologists** recommend staying at least 150 feet away from any known burrow or nesting area and avoiding loud noises, ground disturbance, or off-road vehicle use nearby (U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, 2021).

Wildlife agencies also encourage landowners to consider "Owl-friendly" property management, such as leaving natural burrows undisturbed and delaying groundclearing projects until after nesting season. Conservation groups are working to install artificial burrows in safe

"Burrowing Owls are an iconic part of our desert ecosystem," says Arizona Game and Fish biologist. "Giving them space during nesting season is one of the simplest and most effective ways we can help protect them for future generations."







The Harrah's Ak-Chin Community Youth Program is an extended branch of the Harrah's Development System (HDS), which is geared to offer job skills training and leadership development opportunities to Ak-Chin tribal members.

This year's Harrah's Ak-Chin HDS Community Youth Program was packed with handson work experience, program activities, and leadership development opportunities for the Ak-Chin tribal youth.

The five-and-aprogram half-week exposed the Ak-Chin Community Youth participants to work experience, educational workshops, community service activities, and leadership development experiences.

Thirteen (13) youth participants were employed in the nongaming areas of the casino, which included Housekeeping, Facilities, Warehouse, Hotel, and Restaurant outlets.

All youth participants attended the new-hire

orientation and received a department onboarding from HDS Supervisor, Della Honie and HDS Manager, Erica Oliver.

In addition to learning hands-on work experience in their departments, the youth participants attended weekly Toastmaster meetings, strengthening their leadership and impromptu speaking skills.

They also attended biweekly department meetings with the HDS Associates and Interns, providing updates on their work experience, and new skills learned in their departments.

This year's program activities for the youth participants included tours of the Ak-Chin Regional Airport and Farms Enterprise.

With the help of the current council at the time, she was able to travel to Little Rock with a couple of family members of the missing soldier so they could visit his gravesite and see where he last lived.

This brought great joy to Carole as she was able to give the family peace after so many years of wondering where he was and give them some comfort knowing where he is exactly.

With technology becoming more of a constant in our lives, Carole also stressed to the youth that they are our future, they will be the one's that will one day take over their community, they could be the head of different departments, maybe even council members.

She urged them to get more involved in their community, ask questions, volunteer their time, and have the ambition to want to make a change. That is a way to preserve their history

and learn where they come from; to truly get an understanding of who they are as O'odham; so, they can pass on what they know to future generations, in doing so their tribe and himdag won't ever disappear.

Lopez ended with some advice that she hopes the youth will take with them, which was to always follow their cultural ways.

"We're unique because we are O'odham, we are different because we have to learn to adapt in a non-O'odham society... if we continue to live fully in that society without knowing where we come from, eventually we will be stuck in that world and who we are as O'odham will be lost...

Always be proud of who you are, be proud of your heritage, keep your culture going; no one can ever take that away from you, take care of yourself, be your own person, love yourself."

Chairman Lopez added how learning a strong work ethic at a young



to the position he is in now. He was taught to be respectful of himself and to others, no matter where he went, because his character is not only a reflection of himself, but his parents, grandparents, and community.

He also advised the youth to take care of their mental health, because keeping everything bottled up inside can eventually become a sickness that can take over their life. He urged them to talk to their elders, because they are the ones that have the most information about their history.


Lopez left the youth with one last message, "Remember who you are,




